When the AC is running in the summer the bill was \$80-85/month but closer to \$30/month in the autumn, winter and spring. The base gas bill is \$7/month and I never saw it go over \$25/month when I was cooking a lot. I

used to love watching the snowplow take care of the parking lot and driveway, and to pop next door to the convenience store if I ran out of eggs or milk. Sprouts is a great grocery store just two minutes away, and walking a dog up to Publik for coffee is a wonderful way to start the day. The hallways and staircase, the massive entrance door and marble steps, the sense of community in the building, and the option to hide out in my cozy refuge made me very reluctant to sell, and to leave the building. I truly loved and still love that space.
